



Dress Code Policy

Gar-Field Students are expected to follow the guidelines in the PWCS Code of Behavior for Student Dress:

- Students are urged to dress for success each school day. Their overall
 appearance should be based on the health and safety of an inclusive school
 community. Students should not wear any item of clothing which may cause a
 distraction or disruption to the educational process or compromise the physical
 and emotional health and safety of the student or others.
- Students are permitted to wear any religiously and ethnically specific or significant head covering or hairstyle. Permitted head coverings and hairstyles include, but are not limited to:
 - Braids
 - Cornrows
 - Headwraps
 - Hijabs
 - Locs
 - Yarmulkes
- Prohibited items of clothing include:
 - Clothing items which:
 - Reveal bare skin to the extent that they distract or may foreseeably distract other students or staff.
 - Reveal or expose undergarments.
 - Fit in a manner as to reveal or expose undergarments.
 - Contain vulgar, discriminatory, lewd, patently offensive, or obscene language or images.
 - Contain threats or gang symbols.
 - Promote the use of weapons and violence, or the use of alcohol, tobacco, or illegal drugs, and/or associated paraphernalia.
 - Cause or may foreseeably cause a disruption to the learning environment.
 - Are accessories that could be regarded as or used as a weapon.
 - Headwear that covers one's entire head or face, unless the headwear is:
 - Worn as part of one's religion.
 - Worn for medical reasons.
 - Worn for personal prevention practices as in the case of the spread of infectious diseases.
 - Worn for an approved school event.
 - Worn as an expression of one's cultural or ethnic background.

- Ski masks or other full-face coverings are strictly prohibited, except for religious or cultural head and face coverings. Students may not wear a ski mask at any time, even if it is rolled up to appear as a hat.
- Clothing or headwear must not obscure a student's identity at any time
- Students must be able to freely communicate with school staff at all times for safety and to promote student learning. Students are not permitted to use or wear headphones or earbuds in class and must have at least 1 ear open in the halls.

	The Gar-Field High School library is located on the second floor at the center of the building. Many staff and student events and activities are hosted in the library, including the writing club, book club, lunchtime events and programming, #Books2Go, and Prom Closet. Students and classes have access to over 21,000 fiction and nonfiction books, audiobooks, and
	e-books, as well as databases and subscription sites for research and exploration. The library is stocked with chess sets, comfortable seating areas, classroom spaces, a reflection room, a green screen, podcasting equipment, and (soon!) a makerspace. Students can spend time before and after school and during lunch in the library. They have access to a printer (black and white only) and a copy machine (also black and white only).
	 General: School rules-including those regarding hall passes, conduct, and device use-apply in the library. Students who break school rules or
	are disrespectful to library staff or materials may be asked to leave, referred to their administrator for discipline, and/or barred from returning to the library.
	 The library is NOT a cut-through. Students should use the hallways to get across the buildings.
	 Students must use the double doors to enter and leave the library. Checkout limits: 5 books at a time for 3 weeks at a time. Books may be renewed (as long as another student hasn't placed a hold for the book)
	No late fees are charged.
	 To use the makerspace or podcast studio, students must complete all required training, sign a contract, and be properly supervised.
	 Students may not use the makerspace or podcast studio without teacher supervision. Librarians do not supervise students in these areas during the school day.
	 Students may freely use the supplies at the supply table, but the supplies must remain in the library.
	 Students are expected to clean up after themselves. Please don't leave trash behind.
	• Students without a class must get a pass from their counselor (every time) to be in the library during class time.
	Before School:
	Students are expected to be polite and respectful as they wait for the library to open.
	 The library is open every morning for students to check out books, print, play chess, and socialize before the morning bell.
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	 Students must leave when the warning bell rings. Library staff will not write late passes for students who linger. During Class: Class time in the library is only for work. No chess, hanging out, or socializing is allowed. Students may come to the library to work, print, or use the Zen Den with an appropriate pass from their teacher. Cell phones and backpacks should remain in the classroom. Students will be sent back to class after 15 minutes. During Lunch: Students may come to the library for lunch. They must arrive at their lunch bell. If a student comes to the library for lunch, they must stay in the library the entire lunch shift. Students must sign in for lunch using the QR Codes located throughout the library. Students may eat lunch brought from home in the library but must clean up after themselves. Students <u>cannot</u> get lunch from the cafeteria and then come to the library. After School: Students must be in the library by 2:30. The library closes at 3:00 and students will need to either have a ride home or go the holding area for the activity bus.
Lockers	Lockers will not be assigned this school year to limit crowding in hallways, however, students may request a locker if necessary. Students can request a locker by using the following link: <u>Locker Request</u> If a student needs help opening a locker that is jammed, please contact security.
Medications Illness	Students requiring prescription or nonprescription medication during school hours must secure a special form from the nurse's office and have the parent/guardian and/or physician's permission before taking any medication. All medication will remain in the nurse's office and will be administered according to the procedures established by the school board. Parent or guardian must bring all medications to the nurse (do not send by student).

School Safety	 No student entry prior to 7:00. After 7:30 am, only Door 1, Bus tunnel, and Door 17 can be used to enter the building. To reduce false alarms students should: Select clear and plastic school supplies over covered/concealed and metallic when applicable. Use three-ring binders with plastic spines/rings (non-metal). Utilize plastic (versus metallic) BPA-free water/coffee bottles. Use hard plastic eyeglass cases (versus metal). Students should "pack-light" and limit the number of items in bags or other equipment. Keep superfluous metallic items home (game consoles, beauty products, USB drives). GFHS students are CHAMPIONS and, as such, it is expected that students act with kindness and respect towards each other and staff. Tip Line

Students, staff, and parents share the responsibility for an orderly and safe school environment.

Information about drugs, weapons, or other factors which may be harmful to the school environment should be reported via the Tip Line or through the "Say Something" Anonymous Reporting System (SS-ARS). SS-ARS is designed specifically for students in grades 6-12 and staff to report any serious or potentially violent concerns of unsafe behavior or threats of harm to self or others. Say Something is a youth violence prevention program from the national nonprofit organization Sandy Hook Promise.

"Tipsters" can send reports on anything from school threats they've seen or overheard to personal crises, including sexual harassment, self-harm, and depression. The system enables school administrators and law enforcement to create effective interventions and intervene upon at-risk individuals to help prevent violence, suicide, bullying, self-harm, and other forms of threatening behavior.

All tips submitted receive an immediate response by one of the highly-skilled crisis counselors at the Sandy Hook Promise National Crisis Center; this person then determines the necessary support steps. When credible tips are received that are life-threatening and/or involve an imminent threat, the crisis center will immediately contact local 911 dispatch and involve law enforcement, then notify central office staff and school-based representatives, even after hours. Users can submit a tip by calling 1-844-5-SAYNOW or visiting <u>www.SaySomething.net</u>. The free app is available for download from the <u>App Store</u> and <u>Google Play</u> <u>Store</u>, where students can submit tips instantly. Once downloaded, it will ask for a 4-digit code you select and remember.

School of Champions

Study Skills

Top 10 Skills for High School Students (adapted from Auburn University)

1. Time Management

There are just 24 hours in each day. What you do with that time makes all the difference. While high school students average 35 hours per week of class time, college students log an average of 15 to 18 hours per week. Getting your "free" time under control now will help prepare you for managing that extra 20 hours a week come freshman year of college -- when you'll need to study and want to socialize more than ever. If you don't already, start using a daily planner. This could be a datebook you keep in your bag, an online version you maintain at home, or both. It's easy to over-schedule or "double-book" if we aren't careful. Manage your time wisely and you'll get the maximum out of each day.

2. Good Study Habits

Good study habits include these basics:

- Always be prepared for class and attend classes regularly. No cutting!
- Complete assignments thoroughly and in a timely manner.
- Review your notes daily rather than cram for tests the night before.
- Set aside quiet time each day for study -- even if you don't have homework or a test the next day!
- 3. The Ability to Set Attainable Goals

It's important to set goals, as long as they're attainable. Setting goals that are unreasonably high is a setup -- you'll be doomed to frustration and disappointment.

- 4. Concentration Listen to your teacher and stay focused. Be sure that you understand the lesson. If you don't understand something, ask questions! You've heard it before, but "the only dumb question is the one you don't ask" is absolutely true. If you've been paying attention, it definitely won't be a dumb question.
- 5. Good Note-Taking

You can't possibly write down everything the teacher says since we talk at a rate of about 225 words per minute. But you do need to write down the important material. Be sure to validate yourself after a test by going back over your notes to see if your notes contained the answers to questions asked on the test. If not, you need to ask to see a classmate's notes or check with the teacher for help on improving your note-taking. Studying with a partner is also a good idea. Note-taking should be in a form that's most helpful to you. If you're more of a visual person, try writing notes on different colored index cards. Music can also be a good memory aid as long as you don't find it distracting. Re-writing your notes daily is another strategy. If you really have a problem with note-taking, you might ask your teacher if you can tape-record daily lessons. Do whatever it takes!

6. Completion of Assignments

Teachers assign homework for a reason. While it may seem like "busywork" at times, it definitely has a purpose. Put your homework to good use. Remember, you'll only get out of it what you put into it!

7. Review of Daily Notes

Don't wait until the night before the test to review your notes. Go over your notes each day while the lecture is still fresh in your mind. Add any missing pieces. Compare your notes with a classmate's notes. This isn't cheating -- it may even be mutually beneficial. Review your notes each day to reinforce your learning.

8. Organizational Skills

Keeping yourself organized will save you valuable time and allow you to do everything you need to do. Remember: "A place for everything and everything in its place." Keep all your study materials (calculator, planner, books, notebooks, laptop, etc.) in one convenient location.

9. Motivation

You need to be motivated to learn and work hard, whether or not you like a specific subject or teacher. Self-motivation can be extremely important when you aren't particularly excited about a class. If you must, view it as an obstacle you must overcome. Then, set your mind to it and do it -- no excuses. Success is up to you!

10. Commitment

You've started the course, now you need to complete it. Do the best -- and get the most out of it -- that you can! Your commitment will pay off in the end.

Athletics and Activities

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

School-sponsored clubs and organizations are frequently an outgrowth of our academic and vocational curriculum. Others exist for providing opportunities in which the student may pursue interests on an extra-curricular basis. The variety of activities should enhance the educational, social and emotional development of the student. Students are encouraged to participate in <u>at least one</u> <u>club or activity</u>. The clubs meet after-school or at other designated times. Activity Bus transportation may be provided throughout the week.

REGULATIONS FOR STUDENT ACTIVITIES

- To form, organize, or begin a club, organization, or activity, there shall be a faculty sponsor willing to provide supervision. A constitution, bylaw, or charter shall be submitted to the Activities Director for approval. No club or organization may hold any meeting or practice unless the sponsor is present. Regular attendance is expected. See PWCS Regulation 642-1 for additional information. Attachment I required for submission.
- 2. All meetings or practices will be conducted in an assigned area designated by the Activities Director with a Club Sponsor. All activity dates, times, and locations shall be submitted to the Activities Director for approval.
- 3. Any student remaining after school for participation in an activity shall report to the Activity Sponsor no later than 2:15p.m. All other students shall vacate the building and grounds by 2:15pm. Holding Area in Lower Café if Activity Bus Transportation is needed.
- 4. All student organizations may have an annual budget approved in advance by the Activities Director. This budget will serve as a guideline in approving or denying activities. Club sponsors will administer, supervise, and be directly responsible for adhering to financial guidelines.
- 5. Sponsors should submit to the Activities Director any requests for fundraisers. The Activities Director will inform the sponsor if these activities are approved. Sponsors should apply for fund raising approval in writing on the approved form. Information will include:
 - a. Name and type of products to be sold;
 - b. Vendor or agent to be contacted;
 - c. Brief description of fundraiser, date, time, and places.
 - d. Submission deadlines shall be communicated accordingly and be conducted online-only until further notice.
- 6. All financial transactions shall be approved and transacted through the school's Finance Office. Transactions shall be approved by the sponsor, Activities Director, and Finance Office. A purchase order form <u>shall</u> be filled out <u>completely</u> before any purchases are made or orders placed. The Activities Director, Principal, and Area Associate Superintendent shall approve any activities that generate funds. Forms are online; please see your Coach or Club Sponsor.

- 7. Furniture or equipment moved or borrowed shall be returned upon conclusion of the activity. The area used should be left as the group found it before use.
- 8. Sponsors for all performing groups leaving school grounds should have a completed emergency care card (blue) on-file. These cards should be readily available at all meetings, activities, and trips.
- 9. Field trip permission forms should be completed by parent/guardian and be on-file for all student participants.
- 10. Sponsors will need to submit the required information for transportation via Trip Tracker and confirm with Ms. Jessica Carranza or Ms. Connie Eisert. Transportation shall be aligned with the financial request(s).
- 11. Posters and advertisements publicizing student events shall have approval of the Activities Director. These posters and signs should be removed immediately following the event. Posters and advertising are limited to the cork board strips in the Upper or Lower Hallway areas, and Common Areas.
- 12. Adequate security shall be planned and provided for events conducted during non-school hours. The sponsor is responsible for the following:
 - a. Submitting a building use request form via SchoolDude and placing the activity on the school master calendar;
 - b. Student Event Form(s) shall be completed 30 days in advance if a group elects to host an event on school grounds.
- 13. Activities governed by the Virginia High School League (VHSL) shall meet all their regulations and requirements. Coaches and sponsors of these activities are responsible to make sure that their group is operating within the guidelines of their governing group. Any activity requiring a VHSL physical falls into this category.

Academic Activities and Clubs

African Student Association

The African American Club combines with the Young African-American Men's Club to promote interest and understanding of the African American cultural experience. Students of all grade levels and ethnic backgrounds are encouraged to attend meetings and participate in many activities, discussions, and sponsored field trips. Many of the club's activities expand beyond the school grounds and extend into the community. The club frequently performs volunteer services, which display cultural pride.

Art Club

The Art Club provides an opportunity to develop artistic abilities through various forms and resources. Students will expand knowledge while increasing the capability to create art.

Band

The Gar-Field Band Department is made up of many different organizations, but each of these has the same basic goal: Excellence in Musical Performance.

"The Pride of Gar-Field"

The Marching Indian Band is one of the Music Department's most visual groups. Musicianship, discipline, teamwork and strong work ethics qualify its members with their esprit de corps. The marching band practices throughout their season to prepare for many marching band competition performances. In addition, the Marching Indians also perform half-time shows at Gar-Field football games and supports the Dale City/Woodbridge community with parade and other local events. PREREQUISITE: Previous experience performing in band.

The Gar-Field Flag Corps

The Gar-Field Flag Corps practice and perform as an integral part of the marching band. Students learn extensive choreography to enhance and exemplify the marching drill of the band.

The Color Guard

The Color Guard is known as the "sport of the arts." This is an activity combining equipment such as rifles, flags and sabers with dance and theatrical movements. The group combines with the marching band and participates in all marching band events and rehearsals.

The Varsity Band

The Varsity Band concentrates its efforts on a progressive musical education for its members. Students learn basic fundamentals, which will make them more proficient on their instrument and also teach them how to problem-solve in their practice sessions. Members are encouraged to study privately on their instruments in order to eventually move up to the Concert or Symphonic Band. The band presents many concerts throughout the year and competes in the District IX Festival. PREREQUISITE: Previous experience performing in band.

The Concert Band

The Concert Band concentrates its efforts on a progressive musical education for its members. Students review basic fundamentals, which will make them more proficient on their instrument and also teach them how to problem solve in their practice sessions. Many of its members are serious about playing music and study privately on their instrument in order to eventually move up to the Symphonic Band. The band presents many concerts throughout the year and competes in various concert band festivals.

The Symphonic Band

The Symphonic Band is the premier ensemble in the Gar-Field Band Department. Many of its students are serious about music and take private lessons on their instrument to supplement their musical study. Only the best students in the music program are chosen and as a result there are very high expectations in terms of discipline, work ethics and performance. The band presents many concerts throughout the year and competes in various concert band festivals. Distinguished guest conductors, clinicians, and soloists are often brought in to work with the band.

The Jazz Ensemble

The Gar-Field Jazz Ensemble program strives to educate students in the original American art form of jazz. Most of its members are serious about playing music and study privately on their instrument to supplement their musical study. Only the best students in the music program are chosen and as a result there are very high expectations in terms of discipline, work ethics and performance. The Jazz Band presents many concerts throughout the year and competes in various jazz festivals. Students have the opportunity to work in master classes and rehearse with many contemporary guest jazz artists. PREREQUISITE: By audition.

Book Club

The Book Club meets every Wednesday in the Library to read, exchange, and discuss a variety of different books.

Chemistry Club

The Chemistry Club provides students opportunities to further academic knowledge of chemistry and its application within the community.

Chess Club

The Chess Club meets weekly in the Library for informal matches and competitions. Club may explore weekend tournaments at local PWC schools.

Creative Writing – SHAMAN

The SHAMAN provides an outlet for student creativity. The magazine provides a place for the publication of student writings, artwork, photography, etc., which result from classroom extracurricular activities. The organization is open to all interested students regardless of grade level. It seeks to prove training of students in the selection of materials, the layout of a literary magazine, etc. The magazine is evaluated annually by VHSL.

Debate

Debate provides the student with greater knowledge into the fields of academic competition, research, contemporary issues and logical reasoning. The student learns effective argumentation skills as they pertain to issues of national concern. It provides the student an opportunity to interview prominent politicians, businessmen and professionals in order to obtain research information. A student participates in local, regional and state tournaments.

DECA

The four points of the diamond that forms the DECA emblem - Vocational Understanding, Civic Consciousness, Social Intelligence, and Leadership Development, symbolize the purposes of DECA. Through active participation in the local, state, and national activities, DECA members develop a better understanding of the business world, become conscious of their civic obligations, and develop social poise and leadership ability. You shall be enrolled in the Marketing Education program to become a member of DECA.

Dominants

The "Dominants" is a vocal jazz and show choir that performs for community and school functions. Competitions may be a part of their performing schedule. All participants shall be enrolled in Concert choir. Membership is determined by auditions and teacher recommendations.

DREAMS

This activity is a multiracial, multiethnic blend of students who are striving to maintain a positive school environment in which everyone can achieve. DREAMS design informative videotapes to be used by other schools and community groups. To maintain membership, one shall have a "C" or above average in each class or be actively involved in a tutorial program. DREAMS meets bi-monthly and invites a guest speaker to address the students on issues of interest.

EDGE Club

EDGE Club is a multi-denominational ministry organized and operated by students. The Edge Club works in the public schools to connect students with other Christian students. EDGE clubs are managed by student leaders who commit to sharing Christian principles and offering their peers support and fellowship. Sponsors provide adult supervision and Edge Club Ministries offer community leaders as coaches upon student request.

Green Club

The Environmental Club (Green Club) is designed to make students more aware of their environment and become involved in its care at school and in the community. The Green Club members design their own projects each year to do or help others with their projects. Some past projects include planting native plant gardens, maintaining the Biodiversity forest behind the school and recycling. Fundraisers and grant writing provide funds for the projects. Meetings are usually held one day per week.

FBLA

The objectives of FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America) are to enable members to gain confidence in themselves and their work in order to improve the business world around them, to better prepare themselves as leaders, and to improve their business skills. FBLA activities are based on five-point plan encompassing business knowledge and skills, financial activities, leadership and promotional functions, school and community service and social awareness. All Gar-Field business students may participate in any of the local activities. In order to participate on a regional, state, or national level, dues shall be paid. Only those students currently enrolled in a business class, or those students who have completed a business class, are eligible for membership in FBLA.

FCCLA

Family, Career, Community Leaders of America is a club that focuses on skills for life. This includes opportunities for self-development, preparation for and strengthening of family and community living and career exploration. Students are given the opportunity to participate in individual and group projects. Videos and guest speakers on topics of concern to teens are a part of regular club activities.

Forensics

The purpose of the Forensics Club is to encourage participation in public speaking and oral interpretation. Activities include original oratory, extemporaneous speaking, prose and poetry reading, spelling, dramatic interpretation and storytelling. Competition is held at the inter-school level as well as the district and state levels. Membership is open to all students in grades 9 through 12. Meetings of the Forensic Club are after school. VHSL competitive events are usually held on weekends.

French Club

The purpose of the French Club is to give students a greater understanding and enjoyment of French culture, customs, and language. Membership is open to all interested students. Members are encouraged to participate in activities and to come to all meetings. Annual membership dues and monthly meeting dates will be decided at the beginning of each year.

Freshman Class

The Freshman Class is the beginning of the planning phase and fundraising for events taking place in later years, such as the Junior-Senior Prom and graduation. The Freshman Class sponsors participate in many activities such as dances, bake sales, Spirit Week and Homecoming. Membership is open to all 9th graders. Officers shall have a "C" average and be elected by a majority class membership.

Future Educators of America – Educators Rising

Future Educators Association is an international program for high school students interested in exploring careers in education.

Gay-Straight Alliance – GSA

GSA meets monthly to promote and support a school environment of tolerance for individual differences and diversity. Club promotes universal understanding and is open to all students.

Health Occupation Students of America – HOSA

HOSA helps students prepare for future health care professions, spreads health awareness to the community, and provides community service and volunteer activities.

Yearbook

Indian Echoes is the title of the school yearbook. Student staff members shall be in good academic standing, apply, be interviewed by the sponsor, submit three recommendations, a letter of permission from the parent, and fit Indian Echoes into their schedule during predetermined time slot.

Gar-Field Dance Team

The Gar-Field Dance Team was formed for the purpose of providing synchronized dance/kick/pom pom routines at football and basketball games. Tryouts are open each spring. Any girl who likes to dance is encouraged to try out. Practices are held after-school. Performances during games and weekend competitions.

International Club

The International Club strives to incorporate multicultural backgrounds and tastes to enhance the global tendencies of international countries.

Junior Class

The Junior Class promotes school spirit and sponsors various fundraising activities such as bake sales and dances. This class is responsible for the prom, the class float, Spirit Week, and other projects. Membership is open to all Juniors. Officers shall have a "C" average and be elected by majority class membership.

Key Club

The Key Club is the world's largest youth service organization and is sponsored by Kiwanis International. As stated in the Key Club bylaws, its' motto is: "Caring - - Our way of Life". The Key Club's objective is to build leadership and initiative in young citizens by improving the total environment of school and community through cooperative effort.

Latin Student Association

Latin Student Association is about bringing students together share, learn, and talk about the culture and heritage of Latin America. Students may share and talk about the types of food, music, movies, and media from the different countries in Latin America. Students may also learn new vocabulary and the variations of the Spanish language throughout Latin American countries.

Math Club

The objective of the Math Club is to prepare students for math contests, to stimulate their interest in various math related careers and to provide a tutoring referral service. Any student who has maintained a 3.0 average (B) and is enrolled in Algebra II or above may be a member of this club. The club meets after school, as announced.

Model United Nations Club

Members of the Model UN Club expand their knowledge of contemporary global issues by portraying nations in simulated United Nations meetings. We usually attend six competitions a year as well as hosting the Gar-Field Model UN Conference and a model Security Council meeting.

Muslim Student Association – MSA

MSA promotes interaction, portrayal, understanding and acknowledgements of Muslims through educational activities. All students are able to attend.

National Honor Society

The Helen H. Parr Chapter of the National Honor Society is an association of juniors and seniors who are selected by Faculty Council with the advice of the faculty and staff of Gar-Field High School in accordance with the National Honor Society Constitution. To be considered for membership, students shall have a cumulative grade point average of 3.6 of all courses taken. Students shall also exhibit exceptionally high character, active leadership, scholarship and service to the school and community. The Society will select new members once each school year. The main induction will be in the Fall. Once selected, membership is permanent if the student abides by the society's rules. All National Honor Society members conduct and participate in school and community service projects, student leadership activities, and citizen education events throughout their membership.

Orchestra

The Orchestra meets as a string section during 5th period and after school with woodwinds, brass and percussion. Concerts feature a variety of music and usually occur in October, December, March and May. Rehearsals start about six weeks before a performance – once a week after school. Qualified wind and string players are encouraged to audition for all-county, regional, and all-state orchestras. The Gar-Field orchestra travels to the District IX Festival and makes another special trip every year. There is no charge to members other than the rental of certain instruments. Membership is open to all string students and wind players who make arrangements with the Orchestra Director. A schedule of activities for the year is available from the Director and all rehearsals are written up in the daily notices. For additional information,

9th Grade Orchestra

The orchestra meets first period every day. The orchestra performs four to five concerts per year and participates in District Orchestra Festival. Students are encouraged to audition for All-County, Junior Regional, senior Regional and All-State Orchestras. Membership is open to all 9th grade strings players.

Chamber Orchestra

The Chamber Orchestra is a select orchestra that performs for community and special functions along with regular concerts and festivals. Membership is open to 10th, 11th, 12th grade students, as selected by auditions held in the spring of each year.

Concert Orchestra

The Concert Orchestra is made up of all string students. The orchestra performs four or five concerts a year and travels to District Orchestra Festival every year.

Robotics Club

Gar-Field Robotics started in 2006 and has been very successful. Robotics has built a stellar reputation in a very short time in the robotics community. Team members shall be able to make a time commitment of at least 3 days a week, and because the Robotics Team is an academic team, you shall be able to maintain a GPA of 3.0.

Spanish National Honor Society

The purpose of the SHH is to recognize high achievement in Spanish and Portuguese by students of secondary schools and to promote continuity of interest in Hispanic and Luso-Brazilian studies that relates to Hispanic or Luso-Brazilian culture, literature or history. The SHH is classified as a national and international academic honor society in the study of high school Spanish and Portuguese and is sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese, Inc. (AATSP). The name of our chapter is Claribel Alegria it was established in 2016-2017. Scholastic Bowl

Scholastic Bowl provides an opportunity for students interested and capable in areas of science, math, history, literature, and government to compete with high schools in the Washington Metropolitan Area. The team also competes in the newly organized Prince William County tournament held in the winter or spring. It's Academic is sponsored by teachers who are primarily responsible for team selection, and for conducting sessions to help prepare the team for the competitions. All grade levels are welcome.

SeaPerch Club

SeaPerch is an innovative underwater robotics program that trains students how to build an underwater Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) in an in-school or out-of-school setting. Students build the ROV from a kit comprised of low-cost, easily accessible parts, following a curriculum that teaches basic engineering and science concepts with a marine engineering theme.

Senior Class

The Senior Class raises funds to sponsor class activities such as the Homecoming float, Spirit Week decorations, T-shirt sales, end of year and before graduation activities and contributions to the school. Membership is open to all 12th graders. Officers shall have a "C" average and be elected by a majority class membership.

Sophomore Class

The Sophomore Class participates in many fund raising activities such as dances, candy and bake sales. These funds help the sophomores host the Junior/Senior Prom, enter a float in the Homecoming parade, and support school activities. Membership is open to all 10th graders. Officers shall have a "C" average and be elected by a majority class membership.

Spanish Club

The Spanish Club is open to interested students currently enrolled in a Spanish course. Its purpose is to promote greater understanding of Hispanic cultures and the Spanish language. Meetings will be held after school on a day determined by vote of the members. Additional activities may be held

during the evening for special occasions such as Holiday celebrations and meeting at a Spanish restaurant for dinner.

Step Team – ESSENCE

Essence Step Team was formed for the purpose of providing synchronized Step routines at football and basketball games, as well as Pep Rallies and weekend competitions. Tryouts are open each spring. Practices are held after-school. Performances during games and weekend competitions.

Students Against Destructive Decisions – SADD

SADD provides students with the best prevention tools possible to deal with the issues of underage drinking, other drug use, risky and impaired driving, and other destructive decisions.

Student Council Association – SCA

SCA provides a forum for student participation in student body government and in the organization of student activities. All persons who are enrolled as students at Gar-Field are considered members of the Student Council Association. All students are eligible to attend representative assemblies and to participate on committees. Officers shall have a "C" average and be elected by a majority vote of the student body. Each advisory/homeroom is represented by an elected representative from that homeroom. While all students are welcome to attend representative assemblies, only elected representatives have voting privileges.

Student Activities Leadership Council - SALC

The Student Activities Leadership Class is a course to develop and enhance the leadership training for selected students. SALC implements leadership activities throughout the year to include pep rallies, homecoming activities, and other special events. Applications are required.

Theatre/Drama Club

The purpose of the Drama Club is to give students at Gar-Field the opportunity to participate in different aspects of play production. Students are involved in acting, directing, lighting, and set design and construction, as well as other related activities. Productions include full-length plays, one-act plays for festivals musicals and children's plays.

Today's Students Tomorrow's Teachers

TSTT establishes partnerships with colleges and universities that agree to pay at least half of a student's tuition. The TSTT involvement with students begins in the ninth grade, continues throughout college, and then graduates are placed back into their communities as teachers. TSTT targets economically disadvantaged and minority students.

The extra-curricular Athletics Program includes a variety of activities to fit the needs of most any individual student-athlete. There are forty-three athletic squads in 18 different sports. These student-athletes compete with schools in the Prince William County and Fairfax County, as well as other local county schools. All students shall meet the following eligibility standards in order to participate in the Athletics Program:

State Eligibility

Virginia High School League, the governing body of high school athletics, states that a student, to be academically eligible, shall be taking at least five credit subjects and passing all five. Most, if not all, students maintain a 7-course schedule.

County Eligibility

Prince William County states to be eligible for athletics a student shall make at least two Cs and 3 D's in those five classes.

Concussion Training

All student-athletes and parents, per Virginia Code 22.1-271-5, shall satisfy the Concussion Training component before the student-athlete may participate in any in-season or out-of-season activity. Links to online training are available <u>https://online-concussion.pwcs.edu/</u>. Print, sign, and submit copy with your physical.

Age Requirement

A student may not be 19 on or before August 1st of the current school year.

VHSL Physical

Student-athlete shall be physically cleared by a certified physician in order to participate. Physical forms are available in the Activities Office, online at <u>http://www.garfieldathletics.org/</u> or <u>www.vhsl.org</u>.

Awards and Lettering

An end-of-season Awards Program will recognize student-athlete achievements. This program is held in the evening at the end of each sports season: Fall – December; Winter – March; and Spring – June. Freshmen and Junior Varsity student-athletes will receive participation certificates and are eligible for an Athletic Plaque. Varsity student-athletes may receive a letter, pin, and/or service bar based on the number of years of participation. Captains and managers are eligible for captains/managers pins.

Academic Letter Award

The Academic Letter is awarded to those students who excel academically. To be eligible for this letter the student shall maintain a 3.5 grade point average. Weighted credits will be used to determine the 3.5 average. The student cannot make a "C" even in a weighted class. The student shall be enrolled in a full course load of seven (7) classes and cannot have an early dismissal unless enrolled in a work/study program. The student may not be assigned to a study hall. The student may be enrolled in a full year course, which awards only ½ credit. Students who achieve this academic standing will receive their academic letter during the fall of the following year. Once the student has earned the initial letter and becomes eligible for a similar award in subsequent years, the student will receive a pin to be worn on the letter. Students who move at the end of the school year may request an academic letter from the assistant principal who chairs the program.

Principal's Award for Excellence

The Principal's Award for Excellence is an award given to senior students who have brought distinction to themselves and to Gar-Field High School through their achievements. Candidates for this award are nominated by the faculty and chosen by the principal. Only those students who have achieved at the highest level are considered for this award.

Booster Clubs

Booster Clubs are composed of parents who have students involved in various activities. The purpose of the Booster Club is to support the activity with human and financial resources. Various fundraising projects include craft shows, auctions, car washes, bake sales, and others as determined by the membership.

Current Gar-Field Booster Clubs include: Athletics, Band, Choral, Orchestra, Crew, Swimming, and PTSO. Other Booster Clubs may be formed with the request and approval of the school faculty sponsor, student activities director, and the principal. Encourage your parents to become involved in a Booster Club!

Participation Requirements - student-athletes SHALL complete the following in order to be permitted to try out for Athletics

- Academic Eligibility The student shall have passed, at the end of the semester, at least five credits with a minimum of 2 C's and 3 D's. (Freshmen not applicable during 1st semester; upper class students only); AND be currently enrolled in at least 5 classes for this semester.
- 2. VHSL physical Before participation in-season or out-of-season activities can take place, the student shall have submitted to the Activities Office their VHSL Physical form filled in and properly signed by both parent/guardian and physician.
 - a. The physical must be dated after May 1, 2021 and will be good for the entire 2021 2022 school year.

- Concussion Training Student and parent/guardian shall view the online Concussion Education <u>Training Course</u> presented by Prince William County Schools. Submit the signed completion certificate, accompanied by your VHSL physical, to the Activities Office.

- 4. Blue Cards The student and parent must sign an Emergency Care Card(s) and turn in to the Head Coach and Athletic Training Office. Available on www.garfieldathletics.org Important Athletics Information
- 5. Age and Bona Fide Student Rule The student shall be born on or after August 1, 2002 and be enrolled at Gar-Field Senior High School.
- 6. Semester Rule Students enrolled in High School prior to August 27, 2018 are not eligible per VHSL Semester Rule.
